

Introduction to Open Source Attribution and Table Explanation

This document consists of three parts: (i) an introductory text, (ii) a table listing the open source components used, together with their respective licenses and copyright notices, and (iii) the full license texts. The following introduction is intended to explain the purpose of this document and to provide guidance on how to read and understand the table.

Understanding the Attribution Table Structure

Our attribution table is designed to provide complete transparency regarding all open source components integrated into our vehicles. The table follows a systematic structure to ensure clarity and compliance:

The first column identifies each open source component along with its specific version number. Version tracking is critical, as different versions of the same component may be subject to different licensing terms or contain varying functionality.

The second column displays the applicable license(s) using SPDX identifiers—standardized shorthand codes maintained by the Linux Foundation that uniquely identify open source licenses. This standardization ensures consistency and eliminates ambiguity across the global software development community. In cases where a component is dual-licensed or multi-licensed (meaning it can be used under different licensing options), we list all available SPDX identifiers and explicitly indicate our selected license under the "Selected" designation. This transparency allows you to understand both the available options and our licensing decisions.

Additionally, we provide a dedicated column for copyright notices, preserving the attribution to original authors and contributors as required by most open source licenses.

License Reference Section

At the conclusion of the attribution table, you will find a comprehensive license appendix containing the full text of every license referenced in the table. Each SPDX identifier is accompanied by the complete formal name of the

corresponding license, facilitating quick reference and ensuring that all stakeholders can review the exact terms and conditions governing each component's use.

Scope of This Document

This open source attribution statement and the accompanying component table are specific to the MG4 vehicle model. All listed software components, version numbers, licenses, and copyright information pertain exclusively to the open source software deployed in the MG4.

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Because of this blurred distinction, using the ordinary General Public License for libraries did not effectively promote software sharing, because most developers did not use the libraries. We concluded that weaker conditions might promote sharing better.

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"Source code" for a work means the preferred form of the work for making modifications to it. For a library, complete source code means all the source code for all modules it contains, plus any associated interface definition files, plus the scripts used to control compilation and installation of the library.

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Fraunhofer FDK AAC Codec Library

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The Fraunhofer FDK AAC Codec Library for Android ("FDK AAC Codec") is software that implements the MPEG Advanced Audio Coding ("AAC") encoding and decoding scheme for digital audio. This FDK AAC Codec software is intended to be used on a wide variety of Android devices.

AAC's HE-AAC and HE-AAC v2 versions are regarded as today's most efficient general perceptual audio codecs. AAC-ELD is considered the best-performing full-bandwidth communications codec by independent studies and is widely deployed. AAC has been standardized by ISO and IEC as part of the MPEG specifications.

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Some of the definitions that are in this file are marked as "experimental". Experimental interfaces are normally new

features recently added to SQLite. We do not anticipate changes to experimental interfaces but reserve the right to make minor changes if experience from use "in the wild" suggest such changes are prudent.

The official C-language API documentation for SQLite is derived from comments in this file. This file is the authoritative source on how SQLite interfaces are suppose to operate.

The name of this file under configuration management is "sqlite.h.in". The makefile makes some minor changes to this file (such as inserting the version number) and changes its name to "sqlite3.h" as part of the build process.
